Please include the following with your application:

- An *official* transcript from the academic institution you currently attend or have most recently attended. If your current transcript does not show at least two semesters of grades, also include an official transcript from the previous institution you attended.
- *Exactly* two letters of recommendation, at least one of which is from a teacher/professor. Each letter of recommendation should be printed on official letterhead and enclosed in an envelope signed at the seal.

Part Three

In evaluating your application, we will consider more than the facts of your accomplishments. The following essays are extremely significant in our acceptance decisions. All essays should be single-spaced and in a standard 12 point font, with 1 inch margins on all sides. Essays 1-3 each should be 1-2 pages. Essay 4 should be 3-6 pages.

****Note: Applicants currently residing at the Michigan Branch may choose to resubmit essays from their House application for Essay 4.***

Essay 1:

Briefly describe your education and career plans, as well as factors that have influenced these decisions. In particular, discuss how this exchange will further those plans. Please feel free to discuss people, activities, or events that have been important in shaping you (e.g. family, academic coursework, travel, organizations, obstacles you have overcome).

Essay 2:

Discuss the positive and negative aspects of democracy as they might relate to the nation state of South Africa. In doing this, please critically evaluate the governing structures of a community that you have been a part of (e.g., another state, a group, a living situation, etc.) in relation to those of South Africa's newly democratic state.

Essay 3:

Reese Miller Exchange Scholars are required to be involved in a community service project while attending the University of Cape Town and will be expected to present a detailed project proposal during the Telluride Convention prior to the exchange. With reference to a particular potential project, discuss the guiding principles you would use while researching and planning your project from afar and implementing it on the ground. What problems might you face and how would you address them? How would you collaborate with other individuals and organizations? What have you learned from previous experiences that may apply to this project?

Essay 4:

Please submit a sample of your written work. This can be a paper that you submitted for a class, for your thesis/dissertation, or for publication. The reader of this material may not be from your field of study, therefore, we recommend that you add a short introduction that can introduce the topic and make it accessible to a non-specialist.

Other Considerations

The selected Miller Scholar will be expected to attend the annual Telluride Association Convention prior to and after the exchange. The Convention usually takes place in mid-June for four days. At the Convention prior to the exchange, the Scholar will present a detailed project proposal. At the Convention after the exchange, the Scholar will discuss his/her experiences and findings regarding the project in a public forum.
