Dear Editor:

Trustees' meeting was scheduled for November 3 this year, and at that time we were hosts for Mr. and Mrs. Waldo, who brought with them Professor Burr after having guided him on a trip to Bryce and Zion Canyons, Mr. P. N. Nunn, Judge Tucker, and Mr. W. L. Biersach. Due to illness neither Mr. Suhr or Mr. Cadman could attend although they had planned on being here. Since there was not a quorum present the meeting was naturally rather limited and confined itself to a general discussion of conditions and ways and means. It was decided to put an oil burner in the hot water heater to match the improvement made this summer in laundry and kitchen stoves. Judge Tucker kindly consented to speak to us one evening on the constitutionality of the N.R.A., and Mr. Nunn followed his welcome custom of interpreting the latest developments in current affairs.

It is with a profound sense of inadequacy that we attempt any sort of expression of appreciation for the month that Professor Burr has spent with us. Professor Burr's work has fitted in remarkably well with both of the history courses that are being given this year, and it was made all the more interesting because of the personal touch and charm which he lends to it. More specifically, he has given us a very brief course on the Middle Ages consisting of four lectures a week, in addition to which he consented to speak to us in our regular Sunday services. The work has been particularly interesting to those of us who are taking history and even to some of the less historically-minded of our brethren. In addition to the specific material he has given us Professor Burr has been of inestimable value in discussions, friendly chats, and particularly hikes. Many of us have the memory of splendid hikes with him.

This is being written in the midst of a very enjoyable Thanksgiving holiday which has proven a great success for everyone concerned. Among others we had with us Professor Hulme of

Stanford, for whose presence we are indebted to Professor Burr; Professor Miller of U.C.L.A., who came up with Mr. Roy Ryden; Mr. and Mrs. Henley and Miss Mary Jane Henley; Mrs. Crawford, Miss Ruth Crawford, and Mr. Paul Crawford. As usual the Student Body presented three plays during the holidays which, according to report were better than usual. We enjoyed a very splendid banquet on Thanksgiving evening which belied the current report of depression, or rather, emphasized the genius of Mrs. MacKenzie. During his stay here Professor Hulme was kind enough to lecture to us on two occasions and we also enjoyed a lecture by Professor Miller. It is with real regret that we turn back to the ordinary routine after a very welcome interlude.
